AN NSS TREE PLANTATION ACTIVITY: EK PED MAA KA NAAM





Investment Awareness Program



The IQAC, in collaboration with the Department of Accountancy & B.Com (Accountancy & Finance) and Krishna Foundation, in conjunction with the Bombay Stock Exchange, organized an investment awareness program.

Introduction: Investment is an asset acquired or invested in to build wealth and save money from hard-earned income or appreciation. The primary meaning of investment is to obtain an additional source of income or gain profit from the investment over a specific period of time. The session began with great enthusiasm as the speaker asked the students, "How many of you invest?" It was a class of probably 100 students or more, but only 3-4 students raised their hands. Later on, the speaker questioned them about their portfolios and through what platform or broker they were investing. Most of them replied with "Groww" (which has more than 1.5 crore Indian users), followed by an activity where she called three students and asked them about their investment plans. The students' replies were as follows:

Would invest half of the income in mutual funds and the other half in the stock market.

Investing half in fixed deposits and the other half in the stock market.

Would invest with a combination of bonds, the equity market, the derivatives market, etc.



Conclusion: The probability of the first student earning more in the short term is higher than that of the other two, as she is investing in the stock market, which has high liquidity, diversification, dividend benefits, long-term returns, etc.

As the session continued, the speaker asked, "Who is the richest person in India?" After attending many wedding functions, we couldn't miss the answer: "Mukesh Ambani." Continuing with the questioning, she asked us, "Who is the richest person in the world?" We got three names: Elon Musk, Bill Gates, and Jeff Bezos. Realizing there was only one Indian on the list, the speaker asked the students what the reason for this was. That's when I realized the importance of the first question she asked as soon as the session started, and the reason for it was the "risk-taking capacity" of Indians as well as the "lack of investment knowledge."

The reason why Indians don't invest in the stock market is because of their lack of knowledge as well as their low risk-taking capacity. The speaker was an experienced professional who had been investing for the last 18 years and had also made a good amount of profit. There are two ways to enter the stock market:

Primary Market: The primary market is where IPOs (Initial Public Offerings) come into the picture, which means a company goes public for the very first time to raise its capital.



For example, Dmart launched its IPO in 2017; the opening price of shares was about ₹400, and the same stock closed at ₹900 (which means a profit of ₹500). The biggest advantage of investing in the primary market is that if by any chance you don't get any of the shares allotted, your money is refunded (which means there's no loss for anyone). Secondary Market: The secondary market refers to the market where previously issued financial instruments, such as stocks, bonds, and derivatives, are bought and sold by investors. It is distinct from the primary market, where new securities are issued and sold to the public for the first time. Conclusion: Investing even a small amount early can make you financially stable sooner than others your age and will also help you to retire earlier.



connaught palace



Tapola, Mahabaleshwar



Arthurs seat point Among the popular sightseeing places in Mahabaleshwar, Arthur's Seat is a famous tourist attraction that invites people from all walks of life to look over the mesmerizing views of the Savitri Valley on one side and the verdant green plateau on the other side. It's the only viewpoint where you can observe the geological contrast between the Deccan and Konkan territories and has a kind of atmosphere that lets you relax,

rejuvenate, and return home refreshed. Perched at a height of 1470 meters above sea level, Arthur's Seat, also referred to as the Queen of all the points, comprises 6 points – Arthur's Seat Point, Window Point, Tiger Sprint Point, Malcolm Point, Hunter Point, and Echo Point. The attractive feature of this place is the floating of light objects which simply means that if you throw objects like a cap in the air, they will automatically float back due to the certain air pressure.



eleplant point

The most picturesque viewpoint in Mahabaleshwar, Elephant's Head Point offers a mesmerizing view of the Sahyadri ranges to people of all age groups. Lying just beyond Lodwick Point, Elephant's Head Point, also referred to as Needle's Point, is an overhanging cliff that invites solo travelers, couples, and families with children to spend some quality time in tranquility, far away from the hustle-bustle of everyday city life. Human Ludo

M. L. Dahanukar College of Commerce, an exciting and creative event took place that transformed the traditional board game of Ludo into a lively and interactive experience called "Human Ludo."

Ludo is a classic game that typically requires four players, each with four tokens that represent them on the board. The objective of the game is to move all of your tokens from the starting point to your home area, while also trying to knock out your opponents' tokens along the way. Players take turns rolling a dice to determine how many spaces they can move their tokens. The game combines elements of strategy, as players must decide the best moves to make, with a bit of luck, as the outcome depends on the dice rolls.

In this unique version of Ludo, the game was brought to life by using actual people instead of tokens. Each player represented a token and stood in their own designated "house." The game still required four participants, just like the traditional version. However, instead of moving small pieces on a board, the players physically moved around a large playing area that was set up to resemble a Ludo board.

As the game began, each player took turns rolling the dice. The number rolled determined how many steps they could take in the playing area. The players had to navigate around each other, trying to reach their home while also attempting to "knock out" their opponents by landing on the same space. If a player landed on the same spot as an opponent, that opponent would have to return to their starting point, adding an extra layer of excitement and competition to the game.

The Human Ludo event not only made the game more engaging but also encouraged participants to be active and interact with one another. Laughter and cheers filled the air as friends played together, strategizing their moves and celebrating their victories. The physical aspect of the game added a new level of fun, making it a memorable experience for everyone involved.
